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

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COALITION GOVERNMENT CHAMPIONS CLEANER ENERGY TRANSITION WITH HYDROGEN DUAL-FUEL GENERATOR TRIAL

Advancing Fiji's sustainable energy ambitions towards cleaner energy and decreased reliance on imported fossil fuels, Fiji Gas, in collaboration with the Obayashi Corporation of Japan, and Halcyon Power of New Zealand recently demonstrated a hydrogen dual-fuel generator at the Lautoka Depot. This was highlighted by the Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Trade, Cooperatives, Small and Medium Enterprises and Communications, Hon. Manoa Kamikamica during parliament this morning.

The Minister said this project represents a significant leap in our efforts to transition towards cleaner energy sources and reduce dependency on imported fossil fuels. He added, this project is about testing on how Fiji can use a cleaner fuel, in this case, hydrogen, to produce electricity. "This generator at the Lautoka Depot is a trial run, helping us learn what works and what needs to improve before we adopt this technology on a larger scale. More importantly, it will help

us understand the infrastructure and policies we need to support hydrogen use, making it easier for us to adopt this clean energy technology on a larger scale." "Hydrogen is seen as a game changer. It can replace fossil fuels in many areas, from powering generators to fuelling vehicles and vessels." The Minister said this achievement traces back to the New Zealand Trade Mission in 2023. in which the Coalition Government reinforced the strong relationship between Fiji and New Zealand under the Duavata Partnership.

As part of the mission, The Coalition Government engaged in productive discussions with the New Zealand Government, which laid the foundation for what has now become the process of how green hydrogen energy is produced.

Through the Taupō Hydrogen Partnership, Halcyon Power Limited oversees the production of green hydrogen and facilitates its transportation from New Zealand to Fiji, where it is utilised for the



hydrogen dual-fuel generator installed by Fiji Gas. The Minister stressed that this a pilot project but is part of a broader initiative supported by the Joint Crediting Mechanism (JCM) Financing Support Programme administered by the Ministry of the Environment of Japan.

He noted through the JCM Financing Support Programme,

the Japanese Government has played a pivotal role in making this project a reality. "Japan, represented by Obayashi Corporation, has contributed technical expertise and financial backing, while New Zealand, a global leader in renewable energy, has supplied the green hydrogen and shared its vast experience in developing hy-

drogen-powered solutions. "Concluding his remarks, the Minister commended Fiji Gas for their vision and commitment to this initiative highlighting that this project sets the stage for Fiji to lead by example in the Pacific, demonstrating how renewable energy solutions can create a greener, more resilient future for all.

EXPLORING PROMISING DEVELOPMENT SITES IN VANUA LEVU

The Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Tourism and Civil Aviation, Hon. Viliame Gavoka, visited Vanua Levu to explore several promising development sites and projects aimed at enhancing the region's tourism infrastructure. The visit also included an assessment of potential sites for a proposed international airport. These site visits underscore the Coalition Government's strong commitment to improving tourism facilities in Vanua Levu and boosting its role as a key destination in Fiji's tourism strategy. The inclusion of local communities in such milestones is a vital part of the Government's efforts to ensure that these initiatives align with the needs and aspirations of the people they aim to serve. The site inspections also featured a review of a potential development location that could mirror the success of Denarau, aimed at further expanding tourism

GOOGLE ICT FACILITY TO USHER IN A NEW ERA OF DIGITAL CONNECTIVITY

Today marked a historic occasion as the Prime Minister Hon. Sitiveni Rabuka officiated the groundbreaking ceremony for Google's state-of-the-art ICT facility at Natadola in the Nadroga Province.

This significant infrastructure project presents a giant leap forward for Fiji, in our shared aspirations for a more connected and prosperous future. Prime Minister Rabuka, in his official remarks, revealed that the facility will hold a new cable landing station and will house vital infrastructure, including data transmission servers and racks, and power generating equipment to support international fiber optic cables that Google will lay into and in Fiji.

"This infrastructure will promote Fiji as a hub for digital connectivity within the Pacific," he said.

"The ICT facility will house the second cable landing station in Viti Levu, and one which will strengthen Fiji's internet connectivity, and make it more resilient, with two landings stations, one in the Central Division and one here in the West." Google is investing in four new international sub-sea cables which will also connect to Fiji. These sub-sea cables will connect Fiji to the United States, Australia, Japan, and Chile, positioning Fiji as a strategic hub for digital connectivity within the Pacific.







MINISTER SINGH MEETS FIJIAN DIASPORA COMMUNITY IN LONDON

The Minister for Multi-Ethnic Affairs and Sugar Industry, Hon. Charan Jeath Singh, met with the Fijian diaspora community in London to share the government's plans and vision for creating equal development opportunities for all communities and enduring connections between Fiji and its diaspora. Minister Singh took the opportunity to provide an update and plans, sharing valuable insights into his ministerial responsibilities and outlining future plans for Fiji's sugar industry. He expressed his appreciation to Fijians living abroad for their contributions towards Fiji's development. "In the year 2022, the remittances reached a remarkable \$1 billion, and that has been a support for many families back home, as well as vital support for Fiji's economy. The continued growth in remittances reflects not only

your hard work but also your unwavering commitment to Fiji." The discussions during the meeting were centered on the importance of collaboration to create opportunities that benefit Fiji's commitment and contribute to national progress. DPM PRASAD URGES SHIFT TO FOSSIL-FREE FUTURE

A fossil fuel-free future must be a short-term goal, not just a long-term ambition, says Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Finance Hon. Biman Prasad. Speaking at the closing of the 2024 Global Development Conference at the University of the South Pacific in Suva, Professor Prasad called for urgent global action to address climate change. Professor Prasad highlighted the severe impacts of this year's recordbreaking climate disasters, with economic losses exceeding \$1 trillion. He emphasised that Fiji is taking bold steps, including launching its National Carbon Market Strategy, to transition away from fossil fuels and

build resilience. "The Pacific cannot be the dumping ground for the world's plastic and fossil fuel waste. We must act now to protect our oceans and our future," he said. With over 750 participants from more than 60 countries, the conference underscored the need for collaboration between researchers, policymakers, and communities. Professor Prasad urged attendees to connect evidence with action, saying, "Your research must disrupt conventional approaches and inspire solutions for a better tomorrow." Fiji's leadership on climate action continues to set an example for the global community.



"NOTHING CAN REPLACE DEDICATION, EFFORT & DISCIPLINE" - HON. TUBUNA

The Assistant Minister in the Office of the Prime Minister, Hon. A traditional ceremony was accorded this afternoon to welcome the United States Secretary of Defense Lloyd J. Austin III, upon his arrival in Nadi for a 2-day visit from Friday 22nd to Saturday 23rd November 2024. Secretary Austin's visit marks the first-ever visit by a U.S. Secretary of Defense to Fiji to meet with the Fiji Government leaders to deepen the bilateral defense cooperation. As he arrived at the Black Rock Camp, Secretary Austin inspected the guard of honour, followed by the traditional welcoming ceremony. In attendance at the welcoming ceremony was the Minister for Lands and Mineral Resources, Hon. Filimoni Vosarogo, the U.S. delegation and staff at the Black Rock Camp. In his remarks, Secretary Austin acknowledged the Government and the people

of Fiji for the warm welcome and kind hospitality. The visit further reaffirms the U.S. and Fiji's ongoing commitment to regional peace and security and stronger bilateral relations in the development priorities including defence and security, economy, trade and investment, amongst others. Following the welcoming ceremony, Secretary Austin proceeded to the rugby match organised at the Black Rock Camp. As part of the program tomorrow, Secretary Austin will meet with the Prime Minister and Minister for Foreign Affairs, Hon. Sitiveni Rabuka. The bilateral meeting will be an avenue to discuss key areas of cooperation in defence and security and other issues of importance to both Fiji and the U.S. and the broader Pacific region.



EMPLOYMENT MINISTRY CONDUCTS INSPECTIONS ON GRACE ROAD COMPANY

The Ministry recently conducted inspections on the minimum terms and conditions of employment and occupational health and safety issues for the Grace Road Company (GRC) throughout Viti Levu. The Minister for Employment, Productivity and Workplace Relations, Honourable Agni Deo Singh highlighted that the inspection report revealed breaches under the Employment Relations Act 2007 and the Health and Safety at Work Act 1996. Upon receiv-

ing the findings, he stated that the Ministry would conduct further investigations on the issues raised during inspections. "The Fiji law applies equally to both local and migrant workers, and the Ministry is committed to ensuring that all employers adhere to the provisions of the employment law." The Employment Minister calls on GRC to comply with the provisions of the law and ensure that workers are remunerated with their rightful dues accordingly.



FIJI CONTINUES COLLABORATION WITH UNESCAP



The Minister for Women, Children, and Social Protection, Hon. Lynda Tabuya, met with the Executive Secretary of the United Nations Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific (UNESCAP), Ms. Armida Salsiah Alisjahbana, to discuss Fiji's ongoing collaboration with UNESCAP. The meeting focused on raising awareness about climate finance and developing financial solutions to address social protection issues caused by climate change. Minister Tabuya shared ideas

about the "Care Economy" in the Pacific and proposed a "Village-Integrated Care Initiative" for Fiji, inspired by a similar project in Tonga supported by the Asian Development Bank (ADB). She also emphasised the need to empower women by supporting small and mediumsized businesses for women entrepreneurs, highlighting the importance of providing capital, investment opportunities, and savings programs to help women succeed.

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FROM CANE TO RICE: A COOPERATIVE'S JOURNEY OF GROWTH

A Labasa-based farmers' cooperative this week received a brand-new rice harvester from the Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Trade, Cooperatives, Small and Medium Enterprises and Communication, Hon. Manoa Kamikamica. Founded in 2017, the Wailevu Cane Farmers' Co-operative Limited (WCFCL) began as a small initiative by the 13 members united by a common goal: to alleviate the financial strain brought about by traditional cane harvesting. While sugarcane remains the backbone of their operations, the cooperative members have seen to it that they embrace diversification. Utilising land that was once exclusively adorned with sugarcane, the farmers now boast wetlands home to flourishing rice fields. This transition, however, brought about new challenges. Harvesting ripe rice requires timely action, as delays



2024 health sector report calls for broader tax reforms on unhealthy food

Fiji taxes food rich in sugar, sugar-sweetened beverages and unhealthy snacks but the tax system could do more to promote healthier foods and drinks. 80 percent of the deaths in Fiji are attributed to Non-Communicable Diseases. In Fiji, a diabetesrelated amputation occurs every 8.5 hours. Many diabetics who are not taking the necessary preventative steps also end up having kidney problems and need dialysis. With many unable to afford this, they end up dying. Questions are now being raised on why sugar and sugary products are not being highly taxed to ensure people do not consume this in high amounts. The Fiji Health Sector Review 2024 also states that locally produced nonalcoholic beverages containing added sugar or artificial sweeteners, excluding milk-based drinks, are taxed. Imported sugar and sugar-sweetened beverages are also subject to a 15 percent import excise duty. The review highlighted that these taxes were extended to four unhealthy food product categories in the 2023-24 budget: ice cream and other edible ice, sweet biscuits



(including waffles and wafers), sugar confectioneries (excluding traditional Indian sweets), and snack foods. They recommend that taxes should also apply to unsweetened (100 percent) juices and sweetened milk-based drinks, which pose similar health

risks to sugar-sweetened beverages. The review further highlights that Fiji could transition to a single excise tax system for local and imported sugar-sweetened beverages and unhealthy food products, with tiered rates based on nutrient content. The report also states that Fiji raised its standard VAT rate from 9 percent to 15 percent in the 2023–24 budget. They add salt and sugar should be subject to the standard VAT, while a limited group of healthy foods—including vegetables, fruits, nuts, and seeds—

could be added to the zero-rated list. The report proposes that Fiji consider allocating a portion of the revenue generated from sugar-sweetened beverages and unhealthy food taxes to subsidize healthier alternatives such as fruits and vegetables.

ABC book: A touch of home for Fijians near and far, launched today

Fijian children, both in Fiji and abroad now have access to a new resource that brings the beauty of their culture into their learning. The co-founders of Baka Books, Adarshini Vikash, Samantha Magick and Akanisi Vakawaletabua opened their doors just two months ago with the goal of creating a space where local children could have easy access to books. Speaking to fijivillage News, Vikash says they wanted to offer a place where children could access books easily, especially in a community where reading is not always prioritized due to the cost of books. She says the bookstore's mission is to encourage a reading culture in Fiji by offering a mix of new and preloved books, puzzles, and games for children. Vikash says at Baka Books, they want to make sure that all children, no matter their background, have the opportunity to read and experience the joy of books. She says the bookstore has a dedicated children's room where kids can come in and read for free and purchase as well. Meanwhile, Jane Ricketts and Jo Vosailagi, the authors of the newly launched ABC book, shared their inspiration and the significance of this project. Ricketts, who has lived in Fiji for many years, says Baka Books is a local bookstore that highlights the work of Fijian artists and features books that celebrate Fiji's culture, giving children and families the chance to connect with their roots in a fun and meaningful way. She says she has been very aware for a long time that a lot of children in Fiji do not have books and for many families, books are expensive and she wanted to help fill that gap. Ricketts says it is nice for all children to see themselves in a book

sometimes. She says this book allows children to identify with the characters and images and will inspire them. Jo Vosailagi, also one of the contributors to the book says this book aims to connect with the beauty of Fiji and the importance of their heritage. She says the results of the Year 8 exams, were recently found to be shockingly low

which highlights that children need to start with the basics and build from there. When asked about their goals, the founders of Baka Books say their focus is not on making money but on giving back to the community. They say however, due to financial constraints, many stories are still in the works. They say many parents, often busy with their phones, unintentionally set the same pattern for their children and urges parents to bring their children in to discover the joy of reading and help them develop valuable skills. Baka Books at McGregor Road in Suva is open Monday to Saturday, offering a space to nurture children's love for reading and learning.

Attention is focused on the n ativity scene, the story of the birth of Jesus, and on the spirit of Christmas. Christmas Eve services often include the singing of Christmas carols. On Christmas morning some families also attend church services, but many families spend the morning at home, opening gifts and sharing a special meal. Some people visit friends and neighbors on Christmas Day. Because many American families are spread out throughout the country, the Christmas season brings

a lot of travel. Going home for Christmas is a most c herished tradition so the days before Christmas are some of the busiest times of the year at airports, train stations, and bus depots with people on their way to spend the holidays with their loved ones. Houses may be full of cousins, aunts, and uncles who might not see each other at other times during the year. Family members help in the preparation of the festivities, including of course, making a l ot of food! The Christmas dinner table looks much like a Thanksgiving feast, with turkey or ham, cranberry sauce, potatoes, and pie. No Christmas is complete without lots of desserts, like spicy fruitcake and cookies hot from the oven. A popular drink during the holiday parties and gatherings is eggnog, a beverage made of beaten eggs, cream, milk, sugar, spices, and maybe brandy or rum. The trees are brought home, set up in the living room, and decorated with lights, ornaments, tinsel, and a star or angel at the top. Under this tree, family members and "Santa" will leave gifts. Santa Claus Santa Claus' origin goes back to Norse and preChristian mythological characters who were also associated with gift giving. The Norse God, Odin, rode on a magical flying horse across the sky in the winter to reward people with gifts. In Scandinavian and other European countries, Father Christmas, or Saint Nicholas, comes into houses in the night and leaves gifts for the children, to bring happiness in the coldest months of the year. The legend of Saint Nicholas may have developed from stories of a real Saint Nicholas, a priest who lived in the 300s AD, and reportedly gave money to a poor family. Saint Nicholas became a symbol for gift giving among


Christians. Later, Saint Nicholas was substituted with a non-religious figure, Father Christmas, who was represented as a kindly man with a red cloak and long white beard. Immigrants brought the idea of Father Christmas to the United States. His name was eventually changed to Santa Claus, from the Dutch "Sinter Claas," which means Father Christmas. Santa Claus took shape in the United States, and Americans made him a cheery old gentleman with red cheeks and a twinkle in his eye. American children believe that Santa Claus lives at the North Pole with his wife, Mrs. Claus, and his helpers, the elves. All year he keeps a list of the names of children in the world, and notes whether they have been good or bad. He decides what presents to give to the good children. He oversees the manufacturing and wrapping of the presents by his helpers. Santa Claus supposedly gets his ideas for the toys from the millions of children who write to him at the North Pole, explaining what they would like for Christmas. Children also find Santa Claus at shopping malls across the country. They sit on his lap and tell him what they want. Of course, their parents are probably nearby listening in as well. On December 24, Christmas Eve, Santa hitches his eight reindeer to a sleigh, and loads it with presCHRISTMAS DAY

ents. The reindeer pull him and his sleigh through the sky to deliver presents to children all around the world, that is, if they have been good all year. On Christmas morning, children can't wait to open their eyes and see what Santa left for them under the Christmas tree. In many families, on Christmas Eve children prepare a glass of milk and cookies as a snack for Santa. Of course, in the morning the snack is gone, and they know that Santa was there. Santa Claus exists only in our imaginations. But he, Saint Nicholas, and Father Christmas all represent the spirit of giving. Gift-Giving Giving gifts is a major Christmas tradition. Gifts are bought or made for all people. Often school children will make gifts in their classrooms for their parents or grandparents. The gifts are wrapped and placed under the Christmas tree to be opened on Christmas morning. Some children are so excited on Christmas Day that they wake up at the crack of dawn to peek into the living room. It is hard for them to wait until after breakfast before opening the gifts. Nowadays people often complain that Christmas has become too "commercialized," especially in large cities. Shop owners begin advertising and decorating for Christmas as early as October in hopes of selling more goods. Children demand more

from Santa Claus because manufacturers and retailers saturate the media with advertising. Children's toys have become more complex and expensive. Many kids ask for pricey electronic or sports equipment, while the trend for adults is also for larger, more expensive gifts. Some people believe that the origin and spirit of Christmas has been lost. Every year human-interest stories appear in the media reminding readers of the origin of Christmas. Shelters for the homeless and hungry appeal for money or gifts for those who are in need. Members of organizations like the Salvation Army dress up as Santa Claus and stand on the sidewalks collecting money for their soup kitchens. City police and other groups supervise a "Toys for Tots" drive, in which people donate new toys for needy children. Company employees may take up a collection for a special

charity or a family in need. All of these efforts are meant to FEDERAL HOLIDAYS 54emphasize the importance of giving—rather than receiving during this holiday season. Christmas Stockings Long ago, children hung their own stockings, or socks, over the fireplace mantel. Santa entered down the chimney and left candy and presents inside the socks for good children. Bad children received a lump of coal. Today the tradition of hanging up a stocking is carried on, but now many of the stockings are large sock-shaped fabric bags decorated in Christmas red and green and holiday designs. Stockings are often personalized with the owner's name. In some households all family members, young and old, have Christmas stockings. In others, only the children hang up their stockings. On Christmas morning, everyone eagerly opens their stockings to find small items bringing Christmas cheer. Christmas Cards often listen to this poem before they go to bed on Christmas Eve, in anticipation of Santa's visit. Another important custom of Christmas is to send and receive Christmas cards that express the sentiment of the season. Some cards are religious in nature; others are non-religious, or even humorous. Often the cards—or letters and photos—give information about family events from the previous year. Americans send Christmas cards throughout December to friends, family, co-workers, and even business clients. Christmas cards often include a greeting for the New Year, wishing the recipient, "Merry Christmas and Happy New Year." Today many people choose cards that say simply, "Happy Holidays" or "Season's Greetings," which are inclusive of all faiths. Christmas Entertainment Songs, poems,

stories, and performances are a regular part of the Christmas season for many families. One well-known poem is "The Night Before Christmas" written by Clement Moore in 1823. American children A favorite Christmas story is "A Christmas Carol" written by British author Charles Dickens in 1854. Dickens' story spreads the idea of sharing and compassion. It tells about a poor family with little money to live or eat well, and no money to pay for a doctor for their son, Tiny Tim, who is disabled and walks with crutches. Yet they consider themselves lucky for what they do have—a close, happy family and generous friends. Reading excerpts from "A Christmas Carol" is an important Christmas tradition for many American families. Theater and television productions of "A Christmas Carol" are popular entertainment at Christmas time. Another popular Christmas production is "The Nutcracker," a ballet by Peter Ilich Tchaikovsky which tells the story of a child's dream. "The Nutcracker" is a holiday favorite for people of all ages, as many children dance in the cast. Special Christmas songs, or carols, are sung and heard throughout the holiday season. Carolers from community groups or churches may go from door to door through neighborhoods singing Christmas carols. There are different types of carols: old traditional songs such as "Good King Wenceslaus" and "Deck the Halls;" there are religious songs like "Joy to the World" and "O Little Town of Bethlehem;" and modern American songs like "I'll Be Home for Christmas." Christmas carols, both religious and secular, capture the spirit and excitement of the season.



Climate crisis not just for our environment, it is crucial for protecting the lives of Fijian people – DPM Prasad

Deputy Prime Minister Professor Biman Prasad says addressing the climate crisis is not just crucial for our environment, it is crucial for protecting the lives and livelihoods of Fijian people and protecting the stability and growth of our economy. Professor Prasad says COP29 in Baku was dubbed the Finance COP because all Parties were mandated to agree to deploy USD\$100 billion per year as climate finance. He says the new target - referred to as the new collective quantified goal (NCQG) has been under negotiation for over two years and was required to be agreed to at COP29. The Deputy Prime Minister says given the slow progress to date to reduce global emissions and support resilience building, developing countries urgently require financing to implement both their mitigation commitments and adaptation plans. He says at COP29 our negotiation teams worked diligently to secure the best possible outcome across the negotiation streams and in many cases, Ministers and negotia-



tors started their day at 6am to attend coordination meetings often finishing in the early hours of the next morning, sometimes as far as 3am. Professor Prasad says in the final days of COP29, Small Island Developing States and Least Developed Countries

were left with no choice but to walk out of the negotiation room as our priorities had not been properly accounted for. Together Small Island Developing States and Least Developed Countries represented the majority of developing countries, and we used our weight as a joint block to push for progress and ambition. Leader of Opposition, Inia Seruiratu asks do we really need to send a big delegation but he will leave that to government to answer as we need our voices in COP. Seru-

iratu says they need to prepare now for the next COP, and not wait for the next few months. He asks the Prime Minister to sort out the issue between the Minister of Sugar and the rest of the delegation.

Fijian diaspora invest over \$1M in US-Fiji Drive – Kamikamica

Fijians living in Northern America have invested over a million dollars during the US-Fiji Investment and Savings Drive in October this year but it does not take into account for the long-term impact of the relationships and the accounts established. This has been highlighted by Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Trade, Manoa Kamikamica in his ministerial statement where he says services of some key agencies and financial institutions were made available for the diaspora in Seattle, San Francisco, Sacramento and Santa Rosa. He also highlighted a major difficulty for the diaspora in opening bank accounts in Fiji remotely. Kamikamica says many diaspora members, particularly those unable to travel to Fiji, are excluded from accessing banking services due to stringent in-person verification processes and to address this, HFC Bank in partnership with the Fiji Trade Commission, is looking at a way to allow diaspora members to open bank

accounts remotely. He says the teams have registered a few new bank accounts as part of this, and a formal announcement will be made as soon as everything is worked out logistically. The Deputy Prime Minister says this will mean that we will witness an increase in deposits and investments from our diaspora community. While commending Kamikamica for this initiative, Opposition Bloc of 16 MP Faiyaz Koya highlighted a successful Fiji born Canadian businessman who wants to come and invest in Fiji. He says the businessman has highlighted that concerns on the stability of government policies and the overall investment climate. Koya says incentives and policy stability in different sectors need to be looked at where the the businessman raised issues relating to land lease and whether different sorts of land was affordable and whether government would provide incentives. Meanwhile, Opposition Bloc of 9 MP Penioni Ravunawa has also applauded



the initiative and is urging the government to ensure that this initiative does not only attract financial investment, but also translate to real social, economic development, job creation, and ultimately a better standard of living for our people. He adds it is also important to ensure that the interests of local communities and their environment are protected in any development strategies, and to be in line with the Sustainable Development Goals.

Daniel Kim's bail condition to prohibit him from leaving Fiji

After being held in immigration custody for about a year and three months, Grace Road Fiji President Daniel Kim and Sun Jin Lee have been granted bail by the Lautoka High Court under the condition that they are not to leave the country. They were declared prohibited immigrants by the Fijian Government and it has been made clear through government statements released that the government acted after the decisions by the South Korean Government and the request by Interpol. Kim and Lee are two of 6 applicants who have sought judicial review of this decision of Minister for Immigration and of the Permanent Secretary of Immigration on the 31st of August last year. The decision on their application for a judicial review will be delivered on the 28th of January, next year.

Their bail conditions state that a stop departure order be issued and be prohibited from leaving from any port of entry or exit, surrendering any travel documents, attend court as and when required and abide by the laws of Fiji. They are prohibited from making press conferences and interviews in relation to this specific case

in hand. Other conditions are that they remain resided at the Grace Farm in Navua, provide two common sureties (Aca Rayawa and Bobby Raniga). It was noted in the Lautoka High Court that neither Kim nor Lee have ever been charged or convicted of any crime in Fiji and to the best to the knowledge of the presiding Judge, elsewhere in the world. The Court also noted that the stay on the

and the Permanent Secretary does not quash or set aside the Minister's decision and if it did, the Court would be usurping that executive power. The bail ruling states that for the time being, the Court accepts that Lee and Kim are, technically, still prohibited immigrants. It also states that the stay restrains the Permanent Secretary from actually affecting their removal

and together with the fact that their court cases are likely to be appealed right up to the Supreme Court, would thereby remove any element of immediacy. It states that as such, in the Court's view, the Permanent Secretary can no longer justify Kim and Lee's continuing detention under the Constitution and they are not alleged to be involved in any terrorist activity in Fiji or elsewhere in

the world. The Court is also of the view that the purported security threat which Kim and Lee pose does not justify their continued detention and nor are they facing or have been convicted of any serious charge in Fiji or abroad so accordingly, there should be no reason why they should be continued to be detained. The matter has been adjourned to next Thursday.



Google to build \$200 million Data Centre in Fiji

More business opportunities are expected for the country as Google will be building a \$200 million Data Centre in Fiji. While highlighting some of the Government's achievements in the past 19 months on fijivillage Straight Talk with Vijay Narayan, Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Trade, Cooperatives and Small Medium Enterprises, Manoa Kamikamica says Google connectivity brings a serious opportunity for Fiji to become a really genuine ICT player and become more of a regional hub for the Pacific. Kamikamica says he cannot comment on where exactly the Centre will be built, but it is going to be definitely in Fiji. The Deputy Prime Minister also highlighted

that Google is not only investing in the country but is also bringing four Subsea cable connections into Fiji. He says before Google came to see them late last year, Fiji had only had one Subsea Cable. Kamikamica says the four connections are US, Hawaii, and Fiji. He says one cable runs from Fiji to Australia, and another cable is going to run from Australia to French Polynesia, Tahiti, South America, and Chile. The Deputy Prime Minister says another cable will run from Fiji to Guam and then to Japan. He adds that what they have created, through Google, is an opportunity to be quite resilient when it comes to data centres, and we can also start creating other industries.

Black Forest Chicken Recipe

Black Forest Chicken Total Time: 30 min Prep Time: 05 min Cook Time: 25 min Serves: 2 Servings Ingredients

- 1. 2 Chicken breasts
- 2. 2 tbsp Black pepper powder
- 3. 1 tbsp Ginger garlic paste

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

'Dry Yogurt' Food Hack Goes Viral on TikTok. Is It Worth the Hype?

Dry yogurt is the latest viral food trend taking over TikTok. As the name suggests, the trend involves removing the liquid from regular yogurt to create a drier, powdery snack inspired by Middle Eastern cuisine. To make it, creators typically put yogurt inside a paper towel, press out the moisture, and refrigerate the mixture for 48 hours. Many people have also been putting their own stamp on the trend by adding colors or flavors and sculpting their yogurt snacks into different shapes. But dry yogurt isn't simply another viral food trend, it can be a healthy snack, too. We spoke with experts who explained why this trend is one that's delicious and nutritious. Nutritional benefits of dry yogurt Catherine Gervacio, a registered nutritionist and diet consultant for WOWMD, isn't surprised dry yogurt is trending. "It's easy to pack and carry, which makes it ideal for on-thego snacking, especially when stored correctly," she said. Gervacio said dry yogurt's nutrient quality will largely depend on how it's prepared but notes that there's a lot to love about it. "Yogurt is high in protein, which both supports muscle repair and aids satiety, so you stay fuller for longer," she explained. Yogurt is also known for its gut health benefits due to the live probiotics it contains.



Emma Shafqat, pediatric dietitian RD, says they can contribute to a healthy gut by supporting the balance of beneficial bacteria in the digestive system. "This can potentially enhance digestion, boost immune function, and improve overall gut health," she explained. Shafqat said yogurt is also an excellent source of calcium, which is essential for maintaining strong bones and teeth, supporting bone density, and reducing the risk of osteoporosis. Is there a downside to eating dry yogurt? Both experts agreed that

the quality of the dry yogurt depends on the type of yogurt used in its preparation. If flavored or sweetened yogurts are chosen, they may contain high levels of added sugar, which can contribute to excess calorie intake and reduce the overall health benefits of the snack," Shafqat said. Gervacio added, "If you're using sweetened yogurt, it can contribute to increased blood sugar and weight gain." Another consideration is the caloric density. "Drying yogurt removes water content, which naturally concentrates

the calories in a smaller portion," Shafqat said. "While this makes it convenient and portable, it's important to be mindful of portion sizes, especially if you're concerned about weight gain." However, beyond a potential choking risk due to its dry texture, Shafqat doesn't believe dry yogurt carries any major health risks, provided it's made with natural yogurt and consumed in moderation. Ways you can make dry yogurt snacks healthier If dry yogurt has piqued your curiosity, there are a few simple ways you can

"Always choose unsweetened, high protein yogurt options like plain Greek or Icelandic yogurt," Gervacio said. If you're unsure what you're looking for, be sure to check the protein content and ingredients on the yogurt's label. To enhance your dry yogurt snack, you can pair it with other healthy foods. "Use nutrient-dense toppings such as fresh or freeze-dried fruits, nuts, and seeds," Gervacio said. It's also a good idea to be mindful of your portions. As the water content of yogurt is lost in the drying process, dry yogurt can be easy to overconsume. Gervacio advises spreading the yogurt thinly to make single-serving pieces. "If probiotic benefits are important for you, focus on freezing instead of baking or dehydrating," Gervacio advised. Takeaway Dry yogurt is the latest foodie trend proving popular on TikTok. The dehydrated food involves removing the liquid from regular yogurt to make a portable snack. Experts say dry yogurt is high in protein, calcium, and probiotics, which are great for gut health. However, they warn that using sweetened yogurt can contribute to blood sugar spikes and weight gain. Experts recommend using plain, unflavored yogurt and being mindful of portion size to truly make this a healthy snack.



Daily Walks Could Help You Live Over a Decade Longer

According to a study published online on November 14. 2024, in the British Journal of Sports Medicine, getting less physical activity is linked with premature death. However, the researchers found that increasing physical activity — for example, taking daily walks could extend how long people live. If people were as active as the top one-quarter of Americans, they could live around 5 years longer. Additionally, if people who are among the least active brought their activity up to this level, they might add an additional 11 years to their lives. The authors further speculated that infrastructure changes like walkable neighborhoods and green spaces, which help promote activities like biking and walking, could lead to greater longevity within the general population. Greater physical activity linked to living longer To conduct their study, the researchers gathered data from people older than age 40, which was collected via activity trackers for the 2003-2006 National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey (NHANES). They also used 2019 U.S. Census data as well as 2017 death data gleaned from the National Center for Health Statistics. The team then created a mathematical model to predict how different levels of physical activity could influence how long people lived. They found that the 25%

of individuals who were most active engaged in activity levels equivalent to walking 160 minutes every day at a pace of 3 mph. Based on this, they estimated that if all people boosted their activity to this level, they could increase their life expectancy from 78.6 to 84 years — an increase of over 5 years. However, being in the lowest 25% of activity was associated with a decrease in life expectancy of around 6 years. If these less active individuals logged an additional 111 minutes of walking each day, though, they could conceivably experience even

greater benefits, living nearly 11 years longer. How walking might increase longevity John Lowe, MD, a physician at Restore Care specializing in preventive health and lifestyle medicine, who was not involved in the study, explained that regular walking has several beneficial effects that contribute to a longer life. It can help you decrease your resting heart rate, manage cholesterol, and reduce your chances of heart attack or stroke. "Walking ... can be useful for glucose metabolism," he added, "because [it is] known to enhance insu-

chronic diseases in epidemiological studies. "Maintaining a walking routine helps downregulate inflammatory markers, including C-reactive protein (CRP), which helps improve immune system responsiveness and maintain cellular health," he concluded. How to get started walking more daily steps Dr. Sean Ormond, a pain management doctor with Atlas Pain Specialists, who was also not a part of the study, said that walking doesn't have to take a large commitment to make a difference for you. "Start with small, doable changes that fit into your daily life," he said. "For example, instead of finding the closest parking spot, park farther away and enjoy the walk. Swap the elevator for the stairs

when you can. Take five- or ten-

minute walking breaks during

your workday — maybe a quick lap around your house, office, or

even your yard." Ormond added



If you'd like to take a more structured approach, Ormond said step-counting apps and fitness trackers can make walking more fun. "Set small, realistic goals, like an extra 500 steps a day, and build from there," he said. Also, he said that people shouldn't become discouraged if the 160 minutes of activity mentioned in the study seems like a daunting goal. "Every step you take is a step toward better health," said Ormond. "What matters most is consistency." "So, lace up your shoes and see where a walk can take you - physically, mentally, and emotionally. It's one of the easiest ways to nurture your body and mind for years to come," he said. Takeaway A new study has found that greater amounts of physical activity are associated with living longer. Setting a goal to walk 160 minutes per day could increase people's lifespan by around 5 years. Also, those people who are least active could increase their longevity by as much as 11 years. Walking helps you live longer because it has beneficial effects on your cardiometabolic health. To get started with walking, make small, realistic changes, keep things fun, and build up slowly.

Surgeon General: Health Disparities Remain as US Smoking Rates Decline

Cigarette smoking is the leading cause of preventable disease, disability, and death in the United States. Cigarette smoking and secondhand smoke exposure are responsible for about 1 in 5 deaths, according to the Centers for Disease Control and PreventionTrusted Source. While cigarette smoking has declined more than 70% in the U.S. since 1965, a new advisory from U.S. Surgeon General Dr. Vivek Murthy highlights ongoing health disparities in tobacco use. The November 19 report cites unequal progress in smoking cessation, showing disparities among racial and ethnic groups, income, education, gender identity and sexual orientation, occupation, geography, and health status, among other factors. Despite the concerning data, Dr. Murthy appears optimistic, envisioning a tobacco-free future with reduced death and disease burden in these population groups. The report outlines various factors affecting tobacco-related disparities and proposes actions to promote smoking cessation and improve health equity in the U.S. "Tobacco use imposes a heavy toll on families across generations. Now is the time to accelerate our efforts to create a world in which zero lives are harmed by or lost to tobacco," Dr. Murthy said in the advisory. "This report offers a vision for a tobacco-free future, focused on those who bear the greatest burden, and serves as a call to action for all people to play a role in realizing that vision." Quitting smoking can have immediate, short- and long-term benefits on human



health. The American Cancer Society's annual Great American SmokeoutTrusted Source on November 21 is one of many resources available to begin a smoke-free journey. Factors affecting disparities in tobacco use The Surgeon General's advisory sheds light on multiple health disparities related to tobacco use, such as: Poverty, racism, discrimination, and other social determinants of health. Gaps in prevention protections and barriers to treatments to help with smoking cessation. Social and environmental influences. The report also shows that disparities in secondhand smoke exposure, particularly among children, Black people, and those living in low socioeconomic status, have increased since 2000. Additionally, people who live in rural areas or reside in the Midwest or South are more likely to use tobacco, as are those who identify as gay, lesbian, or bisexual, and those who live with a mental health condition or substance use disorder. "Progress, in the form of improvements in tobacco-related policies, regulations, programs, research, clinical care, and other areas, has not resulted in the same outcomes for everyone," said Adm. Rachel L. Levine, HHS Assistant Secretary for Health,

in the advisory. "We have not made progress unless we have all made progress." Quitting smoking reaps immediate health benefits Smoking is associated with many negative health outcomesTrusted Source, such as lung cancer, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), and heart disease. E. Coli Outbreak Linked to Carrots: Symptoms, Risks, and Recalled Brands

A multi-state E. coli outbreak linked to organic carrots has resulted in 15 hospitalizations and one death so far, according to the CDC. In a food safety alertTrusted Source issued this week, the CDC warned that E. coli infections have been reported from 18 states, with nearly 40 sickened. The outbreak has been traced to organic carrots sold by Grimmway Farms, which are available in a wide variety of grocery stores under brand names including Cal-Organic, Trader Joe's, Wegmans, and 365. The outbreak is still considered active by the CDC, although the products are no longer on store shelves. Consumers are urged to check their homes and refrigerators for any affected carrots and discard them immediately. Escherichia coli, or E. coli, is a bacterium that can live in human intestines and is one of the most common causes of foodborne illness in the United States. There are multiple species of E. coli, some of which are harmless. Others can result in mild symptoms, including nausea, fatigue, and diarrhea, and even more serious, potentially life threatening symptoms. "This is definitely a recall that consumers should take very seriously to protect themselves and their loved ones," Joseph Lambson, PharmD, Director of the New Mexico Poison and Drug Information Center, and an Assistant Professor at the University of New Mexico College of Pharmacy. and products are affected by the outbreak? The E. coli outbreak has been linked to infections in 18 states across the US, from California to New York. Affected states include Texas, South Carolina, Pennsylvania, Michigan, Colorado, and many more. Currentl,y Washington, Minnesota, and New York are reporting the highest number of cases, followed by California and Oregon. Grimmway Farms organic carrots and baby carrots are sold under many different brand names, including: 365 Bunny Luv Cal-Organic Raley's Sprouts Trader Joe's Wegmans President's Choice A full list of states and products affected by the recall can be found here. Trusted Source The contaminated products can be identified through their best-if-used-by dates. Baby organic carrots with best-ifused-by dates are approximately between 9/11/2024 and 11/12/2024, and whole organic carrots between 8/14/2024 and 10/23/24. However, not all brands will carry a best-ifused-by date on their packaging. Consumers should check their households for affected products and discard them immediately. Healthy adults will likely survive an E. coli infection with supportive care, but some groups are at increased risk of severe illness. 

Biden gives son Hunter 'unconditional' pardon

US President Joe Biden has issued an official pardon for his son Hunter, who was facing sentencing for two criminal cases, despite previously ruling it out. In a statement, the president said his son had been "singled out" and called his cases "a miscarriage of justice". Hunter Biden pleaded guilty to tax charges earlier in September, and was found guilty of being an illegal drug user in possession of a gun in June - becoming the first child of a sitting president to be a convicted of a crime. Reacting to the pardon, President-elect Donald Trump said: "Does the Pardon given by Joe to Hunter include the [6 January] Hostages, who have now been imprisoned for years? Such an abuse and miscarriage of Justice!" Trump was referring to his supporters who stormed the US Capitol on 6 January 2021 in a bid to overturn Trump's defeat in the 2020 election. Joe Biden's full and unconditional pardon for his son comes after the president had repeatedly said he would not give him clemency. Just a couple of months ago, in September, White House press secretary Karine Jean-Pierre said that Biden would not issue a pardon for his son. She repeated that stance last month in another briefing, saying: "We've been asked that question multiple times. Our answer stands, which is no." Before that, in June, on the sidelines of the G7 summit in Italy, Biden had said he



would neither pardon his son nor commute his sentence. "I said I'd abide by the jury decision, and I will do that. And I will not pardon him," he told reporters covering the summit. But on Sunday evening, President Biden said although he believed in the justice system, "politics has infected this process and it led to a miscarriage of justice". "From the day I took office, I said I would not interfere with the Justice Department's decision-making, and I kept my word even as I have watched my son being selectively, and unfairly, prosecuted," he said. Biden said he

wrestled with the decision, and added: "Once I made this decision this weekend, there was no sense in delaying it further." "I hope Americans will understand why a father and a President would come to this decision," he said. The announcement comes after the president gathered his family together to spend the Thanksgiving weekend in Nantucket. Reporters spotted Biden out for a walk on Friday with Hunter and his four-yearold son Beau, as well as Biden's daughter Ashley. Senior Republicans in Washington reacted furiously to news of the pardon, with House Oversight Committee Chairman James Comer saying the president "lied from start to finish" about the circumstances surrounding his son's case. But there were signs of unease among Democrats too. Representative Greg Stanton of Arizona became the first politician in his party to disagree publicly with the decision, saying on X: "I respect President Biden, but I think he got this one wrong." In a statement, Hunter Biden said mistakes he made during the darkest days of his addiction had been "exploited to publicly humiliate and shame" his family for political sport. "I will never take the clemency I have been given today for granted and will devote the life I have rebuilt to helping those who are still sick and suffering," the 54-year-old added. The younger Biden has been sober for five-and-a-half years, his father said. This is not the first time a US president has pardoned a member of their family. Bill Clinton pardoned his younger half-brother, Roger Clinton, for a 1985 cocainerelated offence in 2001. In 2020, Donald Trump pardoned Charles Kushner, the fatherin-law of his daughter Ivanka. President-elect Trump has recently announced that Kushner will be the new ambassador to France. Hunter Biden pleaded guilty to nine counts of federal tax fraud in September, for which he had been facing up to 17 years in prison. He was also convicted of three felonies in connection with a gun purchase in June, for which he had been facing up to 25 years in prison. Sentencing for these cases had been scheduled for 12 and 16 December. His legal troubles had been a dark cloud over his father's presidential campaign, which came to an end in July after Biden pulled out of the election race. Biden endorsed Vice-President Kamala Harris to succeed him as the Democratic candidate, who lost the election to Republican Donald Trump in November. Trump is set to take over the Oval Office from Biden on 20 January 2025 - Inauguration Day.

French PM faces no confidence vote after forcing through budget

French Prime Minister Michel Barnier faces a vote of no confidence in his minority government after using special powers to push through a social security budget bill without a vote by MPs. The government is unlikely to survive the vote, which was triggered this afternoon by the radical left France Unbowed (LFI) opposition party and Marine Le Pen's far-right National Rally (RN). It is likely to take place on Wednesday. Despite last-minute concessions, Barnier clearly did not think he would be able to get his budget bill over the line. The New Popular Front, an alliance of several left-wing parties, came out top against Macron's supporters and the far right following early elections in July. The alliance was left furious by Macron's decision to veer to the centre right by picking Barnier as his new prime minister, and promised to vote against the government. This has meant that Barnier has until now had to rely on the RN for his government's survival. The budget bill sought to rein in France's spiralling deficit through €60bn (£49bn) in tax rises and spending cuts. Because he lacked a majority, Barnier was forced to make concessions to critics. These included scrapping a previously planned hike in electricity tax, as well as plans for a less generous prescription drug reimbursement policy from



next year. But the new version of the social security budget remained unacceptable to the opposition. He used article 49.3 of the French constitution, which allows the text of a bill to be passed without a vote, to push through his 2025 budget after the RN joined the left in opposing it.

"I don't think French people will forgive us for choosing party interests over the future of the country," Barnier told MPs on Tuesday as he explained the reasons for his decision. "Now, everybody will need to assume their own responsibility as I

have assumed mine." Marine Le Pen explained the RN position prior to the motion being tabled. "Barnier didn't listen to the 11 million voters of the RN... He said everyone should assume their own responsibility, and that's what we will do," she said. Barnier has warned of the financial and political effects of unseating him, but Mathilde Panot, president of the LFI, said on Monday that "there will not be chaos once Mr Barnier and his government have gone". "We are now experiencing political chaos as a result of both Mr Barnier's

government and Emmanuel Macron's presidency." Barnier was invited to form a government by President Emmanuel Macron in September. RN lawmakers and the left combined have enough votes to topple Barnier. If Barnier doesn't survive Wednesday's vote, he will remain in place as a caretaker prime minister until Macron announces a new government. That could be a new majority government - unlikely given the splintering of the French parliament - or a technocratic government, to steer the country until new elections can be held next

summer. The process could take weeks, as it did after a snap general election delivered a hung parliament in summer. Several parties are also clamouring for new presidential elections. As it stands, Macron is due to stay in post until 2027. Meanwhile, if parliament has not adopted the budget by 20 December, the caretaker government could invoke constitutional powers to pass it by ordinance. It could also propose emergency legislation to roll out spending limits and tax provisions from

Australian police seize \$500m of cocaine after boat breaks down

Australian Police have seized 2.3 tonnes of cocaine from a broken-down boat off the coast of Queensland, authorities said on Monday. Eleven men and two juveniles were arrested, including the vessel's crew and others waiting on the shore to collect the illegal shipment. The drugs had an estimated street value of A\$760m (\$490m; £388m), with the potential to be distributed across 11.7 million separate street deals making it the largest cocaine bust in Australian history. The Australian Federal Police (AFP) alleged one of the men arrested on Saturday night was vicepresident of the Comanchero

outlaw motorcycle club's Brisbane chapter. Biker gangs are notorious in Australia for their drug violence, with more than 1,000 shootings recorded since the 1980s. This recent cocaine bust came as part of a wider investigation into the Comanchero gang, codenamed Operation Tyrrendor, which began last month. Authorities said they received intelligence suggesting a criminal syndicate with links to the gang was planning to import illegal drugs into Australia. This comes after reports last week that the Colombian navy intercepted a semi-submersible carrying cocaine to Australia. Investigators told reporters in

Brisbane the record cocaine shipment had come from an unidentified South American country. The AFP worked with the Queensland Police Service (QPS) and the Australian Border Force (ABF) to track a fishing boat, recently purchased by a 35-year-old man. On Saturday night, it was being used transport the cocaine delivery from a larger mothership to the Queensland coast when it suffered a mechanical fault, police said. Stranded about 18km from the north-eastern tip of K'gari, it was intercepted by the AFP and QPS, who found 51 bales tied with rope netting. Each bale contained 40kg of cocaine, totalling 2.34 tonnes. Two men were arrested on the boat and two others were arrested on the coast while waiting for the shipment. A further three arrests were made at a nearby fast-food restaurant, with five others at a traffic stop. The final arrest

was made in Brisbane after the AFP and QPS executed a search warrant. All 11 men and two juveniles were were charged with conspiracy to import a commercial quantity of cocaine, which carries a maximum penalty of life imprisonment.

Bollywood's highest-paid star made ₹275 crore from one film; has no hit in years, yet ahead of Shah Rukh, Salman, Ranbir

₹275 crore is a big figure. It is enough to be a decent-sized Indian film's box office collection or a big Bollywood action flick's budget. But what if we were to say this is also the amount earned by an actor for one film? What's more, the film still managed to turn a profit. This is the story of Bollywood's highestpaid star, who ruled the box office at his peak. Who is Bollywood's highest-paid star? It is a Khan who rules this list, but not the one most folks would guess today. Aamir Khan tops the list of Bollywood's highest-paid actors, having earned a staggering ₹275 crore from a single film—Dangal. This happened back in 2017, after the film's ₹1300-crore windfall from China, which earned Aamir a substantial amount in profits. According to a Bollywood Hungama report from 2017, Aamir charged ₹35 crore as upfront fees for Dangal. In addition, he also entered into a profit-sharing agreement with the makers of the sports biopic. Dangal was released in December 2016 and became a massive success, earn-



ing over ₹500 crore gross from India and over ₹100 crore overseas in its initial run. This, along with the sale of satellite and digital rights, netted the film a profit of ₹420 crore, per reports. Aamir took home ₹140 crore from that, bringing his earnings from the film to ₹175 crore. But there was more to come. Dangal was released in China the following year, becoming one of the biggest hits ever. The film earned \$200 million

in the country. Forbes reported that this earned Aamir another \$15 million (₹100 crore) in profit share. This took his total earnings from the movie to a whopping ₹275 crore. This was the highest by any Indian actor ever and has since been reportedly surpassed by Allu Arjun, who is set to earn ₹300 crore from Pushpa 2. However, Aamir reigns supreme in Bollywood, given that both Shah Rukh and Salman earn some-

where between ₹120-200 crore per film, depending on the box office returns. Aamir's career post-Dangal Aamir had been the king of Bollywood box office for several years before Dangal. His film, Ghajini, had established the ₹100-crore club in 2008. He was the one who broke the ₹400-crore and ₹600-crore barriers with hits like 3 Idiots, PK, and Dhoom 3. Dangal was the zenith of this spectacular run of form. His next appearance on

screen was in Secret Superstar, where he did a cameo. Since then, Aamir has done two films in lead, and both have been massive box office bombs. Thugs of Hindostan remains one of the worst flops in Bollywood history, and Laal Singh Chaddha, too, bombed upon release in 2022. Even as other stars rebounded (Shah Rukh most notably), Aamir remains Bollywood's highest-paid star.
























Seven Home Games for Drua in 2025 DRUA

Fiji coach Osea Kolinisau was delighted his side had broken their long run without a title: "It's been a long time coming," he said. "I'm so happy for the boys. I'm so happy that we've got the monkey off our back now.

And he added that he wanted his side to challenge for more titles this season. "We want to be consistent. We've worked really hard this last six months. We were disappointed at the Olympics. I told the boys hard work pays off and it paid off here."

Bronze final: Clever Argentina shut out All Blacks Sevens

Argentina demonstrated their high sevens rugby IQ in a tight, hard-fought bronze final to shut out New Zealand, scoring once in each half to claim third place 14-0

Matías Osadczuk scored the only try in the first half of an intense encounter, going under the posts to give the South American side a 7-0 advantage.

Sofai Maka looked certain to reduce arrears with a long-range breakout run – but he was thrillingly hunted down by Marcos Moneta, a player better known for his attacking ability, but who personified Argentina's defensive effort on the night.

Agustin Fraga darted over with a minute left on the clock to put the result – the third time in a row they have beaten New Zealand in Dubai – beyond doubt

Semi-finals: Spain make it two against New Zealand, Fiji overwhelm Argentina

New Zealand missed out on a first Dubai final since 2019 as the remarkable Pol Pla became the first Spanish player to score a century of international sevens tries, as their remarkable Dubai run continued with a second victory over New Zealand in as many days.

The veteran's touchdown, early in the second half, gave Spain a lead they would not give up, after Manu Moreno had erased the All Blacks Sevens' advantage, courtesy of future star Oli Mathis. Jeremy Trevithick gave Spain a vital cushion late on – meaning Dylan Collier's touchdown – taking the score to 19-17 after the conversion when the clock already was in the red – was only ever going to be a consolation.

Fiji overwhelmed last season's HSBC SVNS league winners and Grand Final runners-up Argentina in the second semifinal.

Joji Nasova scored two of their eight tries as they won 43-21.

Quarter finals: Five-time

champions South Africa crash out

South Africa's proud run as champions at Dubai, which dated back to 2019, ended in a 24-17 loss against New Zealand – who pulled away at the end of a pulsating end-to-end quarter-final courtesy of a late double from Sofai Maka.

Anton Legorburu Anso was the hero as Spain scored the decisive try on the last play of the game to beat Great Britain 19-14.

Fiji avenged their 2024 Olympic Games final loss beating France 19-17 in a thriller that lived up to the billing. The result was decided by a breakaway Viwa Naduvalo try with the clock in the red.

A Harry Paterson hat-trick was not enough for Australia, who came up short against Argentina, losing 22-20.

Play-offs: Young France finish on a positive

Denied a shot at a sixth Dubai title in a row, South Africa set off like a train in their fifth-place play-off against France. They led 10-0 at halftime – but were

quickly pegged back early in the second.

But Zain Davids gave the Blitzboks back the advantage with two minutes left. It looked to be enough – but Varian Pasquet dived over by the posts with the clock in the red, and Stephen Parez Edo Martin converted to settle the match 17-15.

With vital series points up for grabs, Australia finished their Dubai campaign on a high to take into Cape Town next week with a 17-12 win over Great Britain, Henry Paterson scoring the crucial try 90 seconds from time.

Uruguay beat fellow promoted side Kenya 15-7 in the ninth-place play-off, after the two sides had beaten USA (15-12) and Ireland (21-7) respectively

Ireland got the better of USA 19-12 to claim 11th place with a morale-boosting win to make the long-haul flight to Cape Town pass more pleasantly.
