Fiji Airways Denies Allegations Regarding Israel Charter Flights

Fiji Airways has issued a strong rebuttal to allegations of wrongdoing surrounding charter flights operated between Fiji and Israel in September and October 2023. The airline maintains that the flights were conducted lawfully and ethically, despite claims raised in a complaint to the Fiji Independent Commission Against Corruption (FICAC).

Responding to concerns about the legality of a Deed of Forbearance and guarantee, Fiji Airways emphasizes that the agreement was drafted by their legal team and serves as a "prudent and lawful measure" to protect their interests and secure a viable payment plan from the charterer who faced financial difficulties.

Contrary to accusations, the airline clarifies that the agreement doesn't reduce the overall cost of the flights; instead, it structures payments into installments. Although a December 2023 payment was missed, they are actively communicating with the charterer and expect full payment of the outstanding balance soon.

Fiji Airways concludes by reiterating that the decision to operate the Israel flights was motivated purely by commercial considerations, further dismissing allegations of improper actions.

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13 Face Court Over Record Fiji Meth Bust: Bail Sought

Thirteen individuals, including Justin Ho, David Heritage, and Jale Aukerea, stood before the Nadi Magistrates Court today, charged in connection with the staggering seizure of over four tonnes of methamphetamine in Nadi. This haul, estimated to hold a street value exceeding two billion dollars, represents the largest meth bust in Fijian history. their arrest, argued for bail, citing extended detention without trial. The court's decision on bail applications is currently pending.

This case promises to be a landmark one, raising crucial questions about Fiji's drug trade and the fight against illegal narcotics. Stay tuned for further updates as the case unfolds. Former Fiji Squash rep Jus-





The accused face a multitude of charges, including unlawful importation and possession of illicit drugs, as well as suspicion of using proceeds of crime for importation and transportation. While details remain under wraps, the sheer size of the seizure throws the spotlight on Fiji's battle against drug trafficking. Defense lawyers for the accused, held in custody since tin Steven Masih Ho is among 13 people facing charges in connection with the Nadi meth seizure case alongside David Otto Heritage, Louie Frank Logaivau, Issac Lesiyanawai, Ratu Aporosa Davelevu, Sakiusa Tuva, Iosefo Roqica, Maika Yabakivou, Ratu Osea Levula, Cathy Tuirabe, Nancy Mateyawa, Jale Aukerea, and Keanie Mcpherson.

Fiji Police investigations into the record-breaking drug busts are far from over, with Assistant Commissioner of Police - Crime Mesake Waqa revealing a foreign national linked to a known syndicate is now in their sights.

"We're working closely with international partners, expecting more arrests," ACP Waqa stated. Their focus is two-fold: following the money trail and uncovering potential local accomplices.

"Investigations have identi-

fied a foreign national tied to a syndicate," he confirmed, "and we're pursuing them with international assistance."

He expressed gratitude for information sharing that led to the arrest of three key suspects in the Northern Division attempting to flee the country. Additionally, he acknowledged individuals who volunteered crucial information about suspected illegal activities.

Thirteen individuals already faced court on charges related to the seized drugs, valued at over two billion dollars. However, ACP Waqa emphasized that police will remain tightlipped until significant developments emerge.

"Our commitment is unwavering: bringing those involved in the drug trade to justice," he declared. "With international support, we are confident in disrupting these syndicates. No one is above the law."

California braces for a stronger atmospheric river this weekend



California is bracing for a stronger and longer-lasting atmospheric river event this weekend, which is expected to bring mudslides, damaging winds, and heavy mountain snow and has already triggered flood watches for nearly 40 million people.

The Weather Prediction Center has issued a rare Level 4 of 4 risk of excessive rainfall for Santa Barbara and Oxnard on Sunday. A more widespread Level 3 risk exists for much of coastal California, including San Francisco down through Los Angeles.

It's hard to emphasize how big of a deal and how rare a Level 4 "high risk" area is. They are issued on fewer than 4% of days per year on average, but are responsible for more than 80% of all floodrelated damage and 39% of all flood-related deaths.

As of Saturday after-

noon, more than 8,500 members of multiple public safety organizations have been mobilized in preparation for the extreme weather, Nancy Ward, director of the Governor's Office of Emergency Services, said in a news conference on Saturday.

More than 7 million sandbags have been prepared and plenty of rescue equipment is on standby, Ward added. Parts of the central and southern coastline of the state are expected to see the most significant amounts of rain and flooding, according to Eric Schoening with the National Weather Service. This includes the Los Angeles and San Diego metro areas. "This damaging flooding will be a threat to lives and property," Schoening said.

The worst of the storm will fall between Sunday and Tuesday, according to

the service.

Governor Gavin Newsom activated the state's emergency operation center, which will be running 24 hours a day, according to Ward.

Rainfall is expected to begin as early as late Saturday night for central portions of coastal California where a few inches of rain by early Sunday morning may lead to flooding. The prediction center cautioned at least 8 inches of rain is possible in less than 24 hours for portions of the Transverse Ranges in Southern California, with maximum totals just over 10 inches possible in locations where storms repeatedly occur in a short period of time.

In central and southern California, widespread rainfall totals of 3 to 6 inches are expected – more than a month's worth of rain for most. Los Angeles averages 2.99 inches of rain in February their wettest month of the year on average. In the mountains and foothills of Southern California the weather service is forecasting up to a foot of rain. And some parts of Long Beach, California could potentially see more rain this weekend than they typically see in a year, according to Mayor Rex Richardson. The city is anticipating anywhere from 5 to 7 inches, causing flooding and power outages. On Saturday morning, the Ventura County Sheriff's Office issued evacuation orders for some communities, along with warnings and advisories about the incoming weather.

ticipated rain.

Later in the day, the Santa Barbara Office of Emergency Management also issued mandatory evacuation orders for parts of the city, citing "life-threatening" floods. The orders will be in place until further notice.

There are indications the storm may be as strong as Tropical Storm Hilary from last August, Los Angeles Mayor Karen Bass said during a news conference Friday, and encouraged residents to take "common sense precautions." She urged people to stay at home and off the roads, keep up to date with the latest information, and make sure they



The orders, which are in place in anticipation of impacts related to the rain forecast for the weekend, will be in place from 5 p.m. local time Saturday until 5 p.m. Sunday, according to a release from the sheriff's office. The sheriff's office also warned residents of the potential for landslides or debris flows, which may be caused by the amount of anare prepared with emergency supplies.

And the severe weather prompted NASCAR to reschedule its Busch Light Clash Los Angeles from Sunday to Saturday night. The organization urged fans "to make decisions in the best interest of safety."

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Artificial Intelligence and Your Health

How Computers are Helping Medicine



There's a lot of talk about artificial intelligence, or AI, these days. AI is everywhere—from virtual assistants to facial recognition software. The technology is even assisting doctors and scientists. So what exactly is AI? And how is it helping advance scientific research?

"AI is basically trying to teach computers to 'think' in the same way as the human brain," says

Dr. Despina Kontos, an AI researcher at Columbia University. One approach to AI uses a process called machine learning. In machine learning, a computer model is built to predict what may happen in the real world. The model is taught to analyze and recognize patterns in a data set. This training enables the model to then make predictions about new data. Some AI programs can also teach themselves to ask new questions and make novel connections between pieces of information.

"Computer models and humans can really work well together to improve human health," explains Dr. Grace C.Y. Peng, an NIH expert on AI in medicine. "Computers are very good at doing calculations at a large scale, but they don't have the intuitive capability that we have. They're powerful, but how helpful they're going to be lies in our hands."

Researchers are exploring ways to harness the power of AI to improve health care. These include assisting with diagnosing and treating medical conditions and delivering care.

Mining Medical Images

One area that AI is already being used daily is medical imaging. Computers help doctors comb through CT and MRI scans for signs of problems like heart disease and cancer. "AI can look at images very closely, in a way that's much more detailed than we can do with the human eye," Kontos says. That means that the computer may be able to pick up on subtleties that a person might miss.

In medicine, catching early signs of certain diseases can be the difference between life and death. Kontos and her team are testing ways AI can be used to identify women who are at high risk for developing breast cancer. They're using AI to analyze different features in mammograms-X-ray pictures of the breast such as breast density. Women who have a higher risk of breast cancer can take preventative steps, like more frequent screenings. This approach could help lead to earlier diagnosis and more successful

treatment.

The team is also testing whether they can use AI to individualize breast cancer treatment based on imaging results that show how breast tumors are responding. AI may better reveal who needs more intensive treatment, like chemotherapy, and who can safely skip it.

"That way, we could spare women who don't need intensive treatment from unnecessary side effects," Kontos explains.

Connecting People With Care Over the last year, advanced "chatbots," like ChatGPT, have burst on the scene. These AI programs are designed to have realistic conversations with people. People are starting to use the technology to find health information.

Many chatbots are a form of "generative AI." This type of AI can create new content based on what it learns from analyzing existing data. Such chatbots use what's called large language models, which are trained on huge data sets that are gathered from across the internet. The training teaches them to predict what words are most likely to appear after another.

It may be tempting to ask these tools to answer medical questions. "But these chatbots don't actually understand what you're asking," Peng says. "They're just looking at the phrases and making predictions about what comes next." So it's important to use caution if you're using them to seek health advice.

"These tools also don't have a lot of context," explains Dr. Ellen Fitzsimmons-Craft, a mental health researcher at Washington University in St. Louis. "They may be able to state something that's the right medical advice in a general sense. But that may not be the right medical advice for you personally."

"We don't always know what information these tools like ChatGPT are trained on," Fitzsimmons-Craft adds. "We don't know if they're getting information from reputable sources or not."

Still, the idea of using chatbots in medicine has promise, explains Fitzsimmons-Craft. Right now, there is a shortage of health care providers in many fields, including mental health. Chatbots may be able to fill in some gaps.

"Not many people follow through with recommendations provided after a mental health screening," Fitzsimmons-Craft says. "And we don't have enough providers to connect with every one of those people."

Fitzsimmons-Craft and her team are developing a chatbot

to help guide people with eating disorders toward seeking care. Their chatbot is made using a rule-based model, with limited AI. Rule-based means that human experts write entire conversations beforehand. Then, the chatbot picks what to say based on the responses of the person using it.

"Nothing this chatbot says should come as a surprise," Fitzsimmons-Craft explains. "That's in contrast to generative AI, where you have to work a lot harder to build in guardrails."

Her team is now testing their chatbot to see which conversation pieces are the most effective. They'll then test whether it can increase the number of people seeking help after a screening for eating disorders.

Other NIH-funded researchers are studying whether chatbots can help in additional areas, like suicide prevention and encouraging heart-healthy diet changes.

Looking Toward the Future

As AI moves into more areas of health care, many ethical issues will need to be addressed, explains Kontos. "These systems learn from human data, so they may learn our biases," she says.

For example, in the past, research studies have included far more men than women. This means that the resulting data may not be as accurate for guiding women's health care. So, if this information is fed into AI models, that bias will follow.

Recognizing biases before they reach the machines may provide a chance to break this cycle. "Can we end up training the machines better because we learned from the mistakes that we have in our own society about training people?" Peng asks.

NIH-funded researchers are working on these issues, as well as many other ways to use AI in medicine. These include modeling the ways a virus might spread between countries and predicting if new drugs will be safe. All of these projects need human imagination and computing power.

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Here's what to know about the Boeing 737 Max 9, the jet that suffered an inflight blowout

The inflight blowout on an Alaska Airlines' plane on Friday night is prompting scrutiny of the aircraft involved, the Boeing 737 Max 9. The incident comes after other safety issues have been linked to Boeing's Max line of aircraft, heightening concerns about the jet's safety. erate about two-thirds of the 215 Max 9 aircraft in service around the world, according to to aviation analytics firm Cirium.

Both Alaska and United have grounded their Max 9s as the Alaska accident is investigated, leading to hundreds of tem on the Max in dry conditions because of concern that inlets around the engines could overheat and break away, possibly striking the plane. And in December, Boeing told airlines to inspect the planes for a possible loose bolt in the rudder-control system.



Here's what we know so far.

What is the Boeing 737 Max 9?

The Boeing 737 Max 9 is part of the aircraft manufacturer's Max line of jets, introduced with the 737 Max 8 jets, which first took to the air in 2016, according to Airways Magazine. The Max line is designed to be more fuel efficient than earlier 737s, making them more economical for airlines to operate.

The Max 9 jets, certified by the Federal Aviation Administration in 2018, can seat up to 220 passengers and have a range of 3,300 miles, according to Boeing.

Which U.S. airlines fly the Boeing 737 Max 9?

Currently, there are only two airlines in the U.S. that fly the Boeing 737 Max 9: Alaska Airlines and United Airlines. United is the biggest operator of Max 9s in the world. The two airlines together op-

Boeing 737 Max jets? The Boeing 737 Max line has a troubled history, with two fatal crashes of the Max 8 model within five months of each other, in 2018 and 2019.

The first crash, in October 2018, involved a 737 Max 8 operated by Indonesia's Lion Air that killed 189. The second incident was in March 2019, when an Ethiopian Airlines flight, also a 737 Max 8, crashed minutes after take off, killing 157 passengers.

In response to those crashes, the FAA in 2019 grounded the 737 Max 8 and Max 9 while it investigated. Boeing changed an automated flight control system implicated in the crashes.

Last year, the FAA told pilots to limit use of an anti-ice sys-

However, those past issues are unrelated to Friday's blowout, which is an exceedingly rare event in air travel.

What is the "door plug" that flew off in mid-flight?

The "door plug" that flew off during Friday's flight was in use because the Alaska Airlines' jet was configured to hold fewer than the maximum 220 passengers that could be packed onto a 737 Max 9.

According to CBS News' Kris Van Cleave, airlines that reconfigure jets frequently use panels that cover unneeded exit doors, essentially turning the unused exit door into another window.

"For the most part they come with those exit doors plugged with this piece, and if you are a passenger you wouldn't even know there is a door there," Van Cleave told CBS News. "It would look like a normal window." The piece weighs about 63 pounds and is 48 inches tall and about two feet wide, Van Cleave noted.

Was anyone injured on the Alaska Airlines flight?

None of the 171 passengers or six crew were seriously injured but the rapid loss of cabin pressure caused oxygen masks to drop from the ceiling. National Transportation Safety Board Chair Jennifer Homendy said the two seats next to the part that tore off were unoccupied.

The missing door plug has been found. Why is that important?

The missing door plug was found near Portland in the backyard of a schoolteacher, with the National Transportation Safety Board saying that the discovery could be a vital piece of evidence in the investigation into the cause of the blowout.

"At the opposite end of the aisle is another door plug, so they will also be able to compare the door plug that was blown off wit the one that remains on the plane," Mark Walker, a reporter with the New York Times, told CBS News. "They can compare if there were missing pieces, if they were damaged."

Since the blowout, what issues have emerged about the door plugs?

United Airlines and Alaska Airlines say they found loose bolts on door plugs on several of their grounded Boeing 737 Max 9 planes.

Specifically, United Airlines said Monday it has found "instances that appear to relate to installation issues in the door plug – for example, bolts that needed additional tightening" during its preliminary inspections on Saturday. Loose bolts and other parts were found on at least five aircraft, according to trade publication Air Current. Assembly, installation and quality control of the door plugs is the responsibility of Boeing and Spirit AeroSystems, which makes the door plug, the publication added.

Spirit AeroSystems also worked on the installation of the door plug that suffered the blowout, according to Reuters. In a statement on Monday, Spirit AeroSystems said it is working with Boeing on the issue and that it would share more information "when appropriate."

Alaska Airlines said Monday night that "Initial reports from our technicians indicate some loose hardware was visible on some aircraft" when the technicians were preparing the airline's Max 9 fleet for formal inspection.

Were there signs of problems with the Boeing 737 Max 9? The NTSB's Homendy told reporters that pilots reported that the same plane experienced three pressurization warnings, from cockpit dashboard lights, between December 7 and January 4. At least one occurred in-flight.

Because of that, Alaska Airlines had decided that that particular jet shouldn't fly long routes over water.

"They even flagged the plane for additional maintenance. What maintenance never had a chance to be done because of the fateful flight on Friday," he noted.

For how long will the Boeing 737 Max 9s be grounded?

The length of time is unclear, but the FAA on Monday said the aircraft "will remain grounded until operators complete enhanced inspections which include both left and right cabin door exit plugs, door components and fasteners."

It added, "Operators must also complete corrective action requirements based on findings from the inspections prior to bringing any aircraft back into service."

At least 64 killed as wildfires rage in Chile with fears toll could rise further



At least 64 people have been killed in Chile as forest fires rage throughout the country, with authorities warning the death toll is likely to rise.

A state of emergency has been declared as coastal cities are choked in smoke and people living in central regions are forced to leave their homes.

In a press conference Sunday held after he visited the affected areas, President Gabriel Boric said the death toll "will increase significantly" and declared Monday and Tuesday as days of national mourning for fire victims.

Rodrigo Mundaca, the governor of the Valparaiso region, said Sunday that authorities were upholding a curfew in the towns of Viña del Mar, Quilpué, Villa Alemana and Limache to allow authorities to focus on battling the blazes.

The mayor of Quilpué, Valeria Melipillán, told CNN Chile that the fire was "probably the largest ever" in the region and that nearly 1,400 houses in the municipality had been damaged. Melipillán added that while evacuation efforts had been efficient, some people in the affected areas did not want to leave their homes.

Pope Francis in a post on 'X' called upon people to "pray for the deceased and injured victims of the devastating fires that have affected central Chile."

In a televised statement on Saturday, Boric said that the defense ministry would deploy more military units to affected areas, with all necessary resources made available. About 92 active fires are burning in various parts of the country and have so far affected roughly 43,000 hectares, Interior Minister Carolina Tohá said. Firefighters have controlled 40 fires and are still battling 29, she added. The fires come as the country is hit by a summer heatwave, with Chile's capital Santiago sweltering through consecutive days of hot, dry temperatures climbing above 33 degrees Celsius (91.4°F).

Scientists say climate change and the El Nino weather phenomenon are driving forces behind an increasingly warm planet, making events such as heatwaves and fires more likely.

At least one person has been detained so far in connection to the wildfires, CNN affiliate CNN Chile reported.

According to police, the man was at his home in the city of Talca in central Chile doing welding work when a fire acecutor's Office.

Emergency crews are prioritizing the fires in the port city of Valparaíso on Chile's coast because of their proximity to urban areas and around 372 residents have been reported missing, according to its mayor.

One of those fires has consumed some 6,800 hectares, Tohá said. "The biggest concern is that some of the fires are in zones very close to urban areas, at the interface of urban areas, and therefore have a very high potential to affect people, homes and installations," she added.

Toha told reporters that the death toll could rise in the coming hours as authorities try to confirm information from areas they haven't been able to



Earlier, Chile's Finance Minister Mario Marcel told reporters that a preliminary estimate for damages in the Valaparaíso region would reach the "hundreds of millions of dollars." cidentally started and spread to nearby grasslands, CNN Chile reported. The suspect will be arraigned on Sunday in Talca, according to the Maule Prosenter yet.

At least six of those who died did so while being treated in hospitals for burns, according to authorities.

China hands Australian writer a suspended death penalty

A Chinese-Australian writer has received a suspended death penalty in China, five years after he was first detained, according to Australian Foreign Minister Penny Wong. Yang Hengjun, an Australian citizen and democracy activist born in China, was sentenced Monday by a court in Beijing, Wong said in a statement, adding that the Australian government was "appalled" by the sentence. "We understand this can be commuted to life imprisonment after two years if the individual does not commit any serious crimes in the two-year period," Wang said. "This is harrowing news for Dr Yang, his family and all who have supported him. Our thoughts are with them."

Yang was detained in 2019 during a visit to see family in China and charged with espionage – accusations he has denied.

A Beijing court held his trial in secret in 2021 but a verdict has been repeatedly delayed.

The former athletes and business executives may be exiting stage left, but the stars are here to stay for the weekend at the 2024 AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am. World No. 1 Scottie Scheffler headlines the first page of the leaderboard on the Monterey Coast at 11 under, where he is joined in the lead position by Thomas Detry and Ludvig Åberg.

Scheffler signed for the round of the day with an 8-under 64 at Pebble Beach and climbed from an overnight share of 15th into a share of first along the way. The ball-striking maestro was his usual self, hitting 17 greens in regulation and ranking third from tee to green and third from approach, but it was his putting which propelled him to low honors.

Carding eight birdies in total, Scheffler saw four of his par breakers come from outside 8 feet. It began on No. 1 with a birdie conversion from 40 feet and continued around the turn with confident strokes on putts from 8 feet and 11 feet. A hefty diet of pars saw Scheffler arrive at the par-3 17th 9 under for the tournament before the putter once again took over.

After pulling his tee shot to the left side of the green, the Texan rolled in another one from distance with his 35-foot bomb to get to 10 under. A birdie on the par-5 finisher just inside 8 feet completed Scheffler's summit to the top as he holds a share of the 36-hole lead for already the second time in this young season. Scheffler looks for his first win on the PGA Tour since the 2023 Players Championship and will have to deal with a field of similar caliber. Åberg looks as ready as ever to nab another trophy, as do other winners from the 2023 season like Emiliano Grillo (-9), Keegan Bradley (-8), Matt Fitzpatrick (-7), Si Woo Kim (-7), Sam Burns (-7) and Collin Morikawa (-7).

A bit closer to the action are a couple of Scheffler's Ryder Cup teammates who have failed to enter the winner's circle in recent memory. Patrick Cantlay continued



his love affair with his home state of California with a solid second round to get to 10 under while Justin Thomas sits just one more back after two rounds of solid play.

The leaders

Scottie Scheffler, Ludvig Åberg, Thomas Detry (-11) We must give Detry his flowers since this marks the second straight week he heads into the weekend in contention, but eyes inevitably are drawn to the other two names. Åberg did not have his best stuff around Pebble Beach Friday; he struggled with his iron play and lost nearly a stroke on approach. The Swede more than made up for it with his short game, as evidenced by an opening birdie from north of 40 feet and a making a putt from off the green for eagle on his following hole. Åberg tacked on four more birdies across his final 16 holes, converting efforts from 29 feet, 13

feet and 9 feet.

There's a murderers' row behind the leaders, with major champions like Morikawa, Fitzpatrick, Bradley and Thomas who may prove to be the most dangerous. The 15time PGA Tour winner is finding his form with four straight top-five finishes ahead of this week, and it could all materialize into his first victory since the 2022 PGA Championship. Thomas led the field in strokes gained tee to green among those who played Pebble Beach Friday and has proven to be up to the task if

the weather turns sour.

"I'm plenty comfortable enough and playing well enough to win," said Thomas. "I feel like I am. It's just about doing it and getting myself in contention more often and kind of feeling those feelings again. I mean, at AmEx it was unfamiliar, I hadn't been in a final group for a while. It's just continue to keep playing well and just keep working on the things I'm working on and just trying to not make the game any harder than it is really." A tale of two days

Between the talent disparity and conditions easing at Pebble Beach Friday, the scoring difference between the two waves is notable. Those who played Spyglass Hill in Round 1 and Pebble Beach in Round 2 averaged nearly three strokes less than their counterparts on the other rotation in the first 36 holes. Last week's winner, Pavon, is the lone player on the opposite end of the draw to be inside the top five with Morikawa, Fitzpatrick, Burns and Kim rounding out the top 10.

CWM Hospital Overwhelmed, Urgently Needs Expansion and Upgrades



Fiji's Colonial War Memorial Hospital (CWM Hospital) is struggling to meet the growing demand for its services, according to Dr. Josese Turagava, General and Chief Pediatric Surgeon. He highlighted this following a World Cancer Day event, urging immediate action for expansion and infrastructure improvements. **Key challenges facing CWM**

Insufficient bed capacity:

Hospital:

The 500 beds are inadequate to serve the rapidly expanding population in the Lami, Suva, and Nausori corridor. Patients with suspected appendicitis in Navua, for example, may wait 2-3 days for a bed at CWM. Limited functioning operat-

ing theatres:

Only 3-4 of the hospital's 8 operating theatres are operational, hindering surgical capacity. Additionally, a recent incident of a ceiling collapse during surgery underscores the need for urgent maintenance and upgrades.

Long waiting lists for cancer patients:

The increasing number of cancer patients seeking treat-

ment, combined with limited resources, leads to extensive waiting lists. Many patients can only be seen after hours, further impacting efficiency. **Outdated equipment and in-**

frastructure: Essential equipment like the sterilizing machine, boiler, and laundry facilities are in dire need of replacement or repair. The burnt laundry room, outsourced for over two years, highlights the systemic infrastructure issues.

Dr. Turagava emphasizes the need for a long-term solution: Expansion: The hospital's current capacity cannot sustain the growing population. Expansion is crucial to meet the ever-increasing demand for healthcare services.

Infrastructure upgrade: Renovations, maintenance, and replacement of outdated equipment are essential to ensure patient safety and improve service quality.

Sustainable solution: Investing in long-term infrastructure and equipment upgrades will ensure the hospital's continued functionality and ability to adapt to future needs.

Urgent action needed:

The increasing awareness of health issues, particularly cancer, is leading to more people seeking treatment, further straining the already overwhelmed CWM Hospital.

Dr. Turagava's call for immediate action highlights the critical need for government and healthcare leaders to address these challenges and invest in expanding and upgrading CWM Hospital to ensure it can effectively serve the growing population of Fiji.

Fiji Cancer Society Demands Equitable Access to Healthcare on World Cancer Day



The Fiji Cancer Society is calling on the government to ensure there is no cancer equity and everyone is provided easy access to their treatment, management and affiliated services regardless of anyone's age, gender and ethnicity.

CEO Belinda Chan made this statement to fijivillage News this morning as we celebrate World Cancer Day.

Chan says where any Fijians live does not determine

whether they have access to their treatment or not, and it's the responsibility of the government and Medical Services to ensure that our cancer patients are well looked after.

She says a lot of money is spent on treating cancer, and the Fiji Cancer Society believes collaboration between the public and private sectors is critical.

The CEO says the society has been raising awareness for

years on how to prevent cancer from being the third leading cause of death in the country, but now people need to take ownership of their health.

Dejunking Your Diet The Drawbacks of Ultra-Processed Foods

Eating healthy isn't always easy. Expert-recommended diets often emphasize fresh, whole foods and home-cooked meals. But that can be expensive and time-consuming. Highly processed foods are often cheap and convenient. But they also tend to be high in calories, added sugar, saturated fat, and salt, and low in fiber.

Scientists are starting to learn that highly processed foods can have certain effects on your body that may make sticking to your healthy eating goals even harder. Eating too much of them may lead to weight gain and increase your risk for certain diseases, like cancer, diabetes, and obesity. What Are Ultra-Processed Foods?

Most foods that we eat are processed to some extent they're modified from how they exist in nature. Chopping, grinding, drying, cooking, and freezing are all forms of food processing. Some forms of processing are good for your health. For example, cooking meat and pasteurizing milk can help prevent foodborne diseases. But if your food is processed too much, it may be harmful to your health.

Ultra-processed foods are those that have undergone the greatest level of processing. As a general rule, ultra-processed foods are those that have been made using additives, ingredients that you wouldn't likely have in your home kitchen. These include things like hydrogenated oils, isolated proteins, and high-fructose corn syrup. Ultra-processed foods are often made using industrial processes that you can't easily do at home.

"If you're standing in the grocery store, in one of the middle aisles, and the thing that you're holding is in a crinkly package, you're probably holding an ultra-processed food," says Dr. Alexandra DiFeliceantonio, a neuroscientist who studies health behaviors at Virginia Tech.

Ultra-processed foods are designed to be low cost and have long shelf lives. They're tasty, convenient, and ready to eat. Examples include carbonated soft drinks, chips, chicken nuggets, and sausages. Having too much of these in your diet may result in overeating and can be harmful to your health.

Understanding Overeating It's difficult for scientists to study exactly how ultra-processed foods affect overeating. That requires carefully controlling people's diets for weeks at a time.

But NIH metabolism researcher Dr. Kevin Hall has done just that. In a recent study, he compared calorie intake and weight gain in participants who ate a highly processed diet with those who ate a minimally processed diet. Study participants stayed at NIH's Metabolic Clinical Research Unit for four weeks, spending two weeks on each diet. Both diets offered the same amount of calories, sugar, fiber, fat, sodium, and carbohydrates on a daily basis. Participants could eat as much or as little as they wanted.

When people were on the diet with ultra-processed foods, they ate about 500 more calories each day. They also gained about 2 pounds on average. In contrast, when they were on the less-processed diet, they lost about 2 pounds.

The differences weren't due to different nutrients in the overall diet. And, the participants rated the meals on both diets as equally pleasant. So why did people eat more of the diet filled with ultra-processed foods? The researchers aren't sure.

Hall's team is now looking at what else might be in ultraprocessed foods that leads people to overeat. The brain may react differently to those foods, he says, or the gut may send out different signals after they're digested.

The tendency for ultra-processed foods to lead to overeating may partly explain the recent rise in obesity. "But we rely on ultra-processed foods too much to get rid of them," Hall says. "They're tasty, they're convenient, and



it doesn't take much time or effort or skill to prepare them."

Hall hopes that a better understanding of what's causing increased calorie consumption can help guide how such foods are made, or which ones people choose to eat.

"If we had ways to target problematic foods by understanding how they cause overeating, that might help manufacturers reformulate those foods so that they no longer cause problems," says Hall. "Or it might help policymakers come up with ways to regulate potentially problematic foods." Changing the Brain

One way that ultra-processed foods might lead to overeating is by altering the brain. DiFeliceantonio's team is using MRI scans to see how ultra-processed foods affect the brain's reward system. These are the parts of the brain that are activated by pleasure and drive us to seek it out. DiFeliceantonio is studying whether a diet high in ultra-processed foods affect this system, and if the changes lead to people eating more when they're not hungry.

If consuming ultra-processed foods and drinks might make you want more, does that mean you can get addicted to them? Right now, it's not clear whether ultra-processed foods are addictive. But some studies suggest they might be.

"These ultra-processed, highly rewarding foods have way more in common with a cigarette than they do with an apple or an orange or black beans," says Dr. Ashley Gearhardt, a clinical psychologist who studies overeating behaviors at the University of Michigan. "Some of the same brain circuitry turns on when we're craving drugs as when we're craving these ultra-processed foods."

Gearhardt says that eating ultra-processed foods may lead to a compulsive habit. This means you have difficulty cutting back even when you want to. This is similar to what happens with addictive substancAddictive substances can also cause withdrawal symptoms when you stop taking them. Symptoms can include irritability, agitation, depression, and strong cravings for the substance. Gearhardt and others are studying whether cutting back on ultra-processed foods can cause similar withdrawal symptoms. This research may help explain why eating healthier can be harder for some people.

"Right now, we tell people they should feel better if they're eating healthier," Gearhardt says. "But we hear a lot of people say: 'When I start to eat healthier, I feel so irritable and agitated. My cravings are so strong that I don't feel better. I feel worse.""

If we recognize that these symptoms can occur, we could give people strategies to manage them, says Gearhardt. That might make it easier for people to change their eating habits. If you're looking for ways to start eating healthier, see the Wise Choices Box for tips.

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HISTORIC WINS FOR IRELAND WOMEN AND ARGENTINA MEN AT HSBC SVNS PERTH



Argentina are the 2024 champions of the Perth 7's. Los Pumas 7's won the tournament by convincingly defeating the hosts, Australia in the final. A sell-out crowd of 18,000 made sure that the event was memorable and sees Western Australia successfully becoming the new home of Australia's stop on the world circuit.

In what was a repeat from the Cape Town Sevens Final, Argentina defeated Australia to secure the title. It was a convince 45-12 win in the final in South Africa in December while it was 31-5 this time around in Perth.

The final in Perth saw Marcos Moneta opening the scoring. From there the South Americans took total control as veteran German Schultz showed his strength to burst through the defense. Matteo Graziano added two further Argentine tries and Moneta added his second too.

Australia's wait for some points was ended late in the contest. Matthew Gonzalez got the home side on the scoreboard. It was Argentina's match, and tournament, though. The victory marked Argentina's first ever tournament triumph in the Australian edition of the World Sevens Circuit. Earlier on in the day, Argentina booked their spot in the final by defeating Ireland 24-5. Australia downed Fiji in the other Semi Final. In earlier tournament action,

Argentina overcame Spain 28-17 to secure a place in the final four.

Argentina's group stage was also impressive. Los Pumas 7's were unbeaten. The South Americans opened with a 28-5 win over Spain and also defeated Canada 29-5 on day one in Perth. Argentina secured top spot in the pool with a 19-5 win over South Africa. A sell-out crowd amid a party atmosphere in Perth witness Ireland's women make history and end Australia's winning run.

Ireland won the third event of the women's HSBC SVNS 2024 in Perth on Sunday, beating Australia 19-14 in the final to spark jubilant scenes at the final whistle.

In front of the biggest rugby crowd in the Western Australia capital since the Wallabies drew with the Springboks in a men's 15s Tri Nations Series match in 2017, Ireland claimed their first series win in only their second final, ending a 29-game losing streak to Australia in the process.

The sell-out crowd at HBF Park, hosting a SVNS event for the first time, were treated to near-perfect weather conditions as both Australia teams made the final against the odds, but they didn't get the perfect ending, with Ireland ultimately spoiling the party – and sparking one their own. Ireland's first victory "a long

time coming" Australia and Ireland both lost a game in the pool stage, including Australia's first defeat of the season (against Great Britain), while Teagan Levi (AUS), missing through suspension since the first game of the tournament, made an eventful return to action.

She put the kick-off into touch on the full, then immediately forced the turnover that led to Charlotte Caslick's opening score.

Amee-Leigh Murphy-Crowe (IRE) hit back immediately as concerted Ireland pressure began to force Australia into mistakes. Levi again put the kick-off out on the full before Caslick saw yellow after a series of Australia infringements. Lucy Mulhall put Ireland in front from the ensuing passage of play.

It was all Australia at the start of the second half, with Levi – who else? – drawing them level after a switch pass from Caslick, seconds after she'd returned to the field. But Ireland weren't to be denied. Eve Higgins scored from their only sustained attack of the half and they held out to make history. Ireland coach Alan Temple-Jones was almost speechless: "Playing Australia in Australia is an unbelievable opportunity for the girls," he said. "We're extremely chuffed ... lost for words. We've had a good focus these last two weeks. We had a lot to improve on after Dubai and Cape Town ... unreal."

Captain Mulhall said the win had been "a long time coming". She said: "It means a lot and we've been on a long journey. This is massive for women's Irish rugby; we'll be sure to celebrate.

Resurgent Great Britain boosted by bronze

Great Britain claimed the bronze medal – just their second in HSBC Sevens history – with a maiden series victory over USA.

Playing without injured captain Abbie Brown, GB ran in four tries, including a stunning kick-and-chase effort from Isla Norman-Bell. The New Zealand-raised flyer is fast becoming the star of an improving British team.

Earlier, Ireland had put a poor semi-final record of just one win from seven behind them to overpower Great Britain 31-7, themselves competing in just their second HSBC SVNS semi-final. Mulhall was the difference with two of Ireland's five tries in an individual display of pace, power and experience. Norman-Bell gave Great Britain some consolation with a stunning solo effort from inside her own half.

Australia, without the other Levi sister Maddison for the entire tournament through suspension, were too good for USA in the other semi-final. The Aussies had won both women's SVNS 2024 events so far after closely fought finals in Dubai and Cape Town, but hadn't reached a series final on home soil for five years before this weekend.

Despite suffering another setback early on when they lost Bienne Terita to injury, Australia eventually overwhelmed a resolute USA defence to win 24-7, the pick of the tries a 60-metre solo effort from Dominique du Toit.

Ireland leap to fourth in the overall SVNS standings, with Australia still well clear at the top. Great Britain are the other big winners from the weekend, moving out of the relegation zone for the first time this season.

The HSBC SVNS 2024 is in Vancouver, Canada for the next event in the series, on the weekend of 23-25 February 2024.

AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am Shortened to 54 Holes, Wyndham Clark Wins

The AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am has officially been shortened to 54 holes due to extreme weather, making Wyndham Clark the winner of the PGA Tour's second signature event of 2024.

A statement released by PGA Tour officials Sunday evening cited safety concerns and a "Shelter in Place" order for Monterey County as the reasons for the tournament's early conclusion.

"The storm affecting the Monterey Peninsula throughout the day Sunday is forecast to continue into the early hours of Monday with very strong winds. Although conditions are forecast to improve through the morning Monday, after consultation with Monterey County emergency authorities, who have implemented a Shelter in Place order until early tomorrow morning for the greater Pebble Beach community, and out of an abundance of caution for the safety of all constituents, there will be no play on Monday. Therefore, in accordance with the PGA Tour Regulations the tournament results will be final through the conclusion of 54 holes," the statement read

Although one round shorter, the event marks Clark's third victory on the PGA Tour. During the 2023 season, the Denver, Colo., native won the Wells Fargo Championship followed by his maiden major championship, the U.S. Open at LACC. "This tournament is very special to me and my caddie, John, mainly because it's both of ours favorite place in the world," Clark said Sunday night in a call with media after being declared the winner. "My caddie grew up in San Jose ... he has always told me 'Wyndham, if there's one thing you do in your career, I don't care if you win a hundred times or one time, I just hope one of them is at Pebble Beach.""

During Saturday's round at the iconic oceanside venue, Clark shot a course-record 60 that included two eagles, one bogey and eight birdies. Although Clark knew a 54-hole finish was possible,



he said he "wasn't banking on it" and simply kept in the zone during his recordbreaking tear.

"I really wasn't thinking much until you kind of get to that back nine where those last few holes, I was just, you know, see ball, hit ball, try to hit it where I wanted to. I really had a good feel on the greens. So in my mind I was like, all right, let's just get us to where we're putting because the hole seemed like a bucket today," Clark said after turning in his 60. Ludvig Aberg, the 24-year-old Swedish star rising in the pro ranks, finished in solo second place at 16 under par, with France's Matthieu Pavon at 15 under in solo third.

Wind gusts reached 60 mph on Sunday, causing the entire final round to be initially postponed and then cancelled. The PGA Tour season continues next with the WM Phoenix Open, where Scottie Scheffler will look to three-peat.

Wyndham Clark earns \$3.6M, 700 FedExCup Points at AT&T Pebble Beach



The finale of the scheduled 72-hole competition already was washed out earlier in the day due to severe weather that promised to linger. It had been rescheduled for Monday.

Instead, it's the latest tournament to be reduced to 54 holes since the 2016 Zurich Classic of New Orleans when the annual stop in the bayou was an individual competition. Having been declared final and official after being shortened to 54 holes, Wyndham Clark earns 700 FedExCup points and \$3.6 million. His threeround aggregate of 17-under 199 included only 60 strokes for a course record in the third and what was ultimately the final round on Saturday.

Although Clark wasn't as long of a shot to prevail at Pebble Beach as the first four winners of 2024, he still was available pre-tournament at +8000 at BetMGM.

The 30-year-old now has three PGA TOUR victories in the last nine months. He was +6600 to win when he broke through at the Wells Fargo Championship last May and +8000 when he answered with his title at the U.S. Open a little over a month later.

Ludvig Åberg goes into the annals as the runnerup on the Monterey Peninsula. The Swede finished one back. After sitting at or near the top of the betting board just about every time he pegs it, he was stretched to +2800 for the second Signature Event of the season. And the week after Matthieu Pavon was a first-time TOUR winner at the Farmers Insurance Open, the Frenchman checked up in third at Pebble Beach. He was +9000 to go back-to-back.

Elsewhere, defending champion Justin Rose (+6600) finished in a three-way share of 11th place. Tournament cofavorites Scottie Scheffler and Rory McIlroy (both at +850) placed T6 and T66, respectively.

Newly minted professional Nick Dunlap (+9000), who qualified for the AT&T Pebble Beach when he won The American Express and, as an amateur, finished alone in last in the 80-man field.
